## **Official West Virginia Highway Historical Markers Guidelines**

#### Who may apply for a marker:

A group or organization such as a historical society, a family association, patriotic or civic group, landmark commission, church or school group, county commission or agency may apply. **An individual may not submit an application** but may work through a group to sponsor a marker. Such sponsorship must be identified by the group in its application. **The sponsoring group is responsible for purchasing the marker and continuing marker maintenance**.

#### How to apply:

Submit completed application (attached), and enclose all documentation necessary to support all statements made in the application. This documentation is critical in the subsequent evaluation process. Sufficient documented information must be provided so that the reviewers can clearly understand the significance of the subject that is being proposed and what resources are available to support the claim of significance. The application and submitted text will be reviewed and researched, and may be edited by the Highway Historical Marker Panel, who will decide what evidence is acceptable and sufficient for the determination of approval for each marker.

#### The process:

All completed applications are reviewed by the Historic Highway Marker Panel composed of Archives and History staff. If markers are considered viable, research is done to verify supporting materials. Recommendations will be made to the Cabinet Secretary of the Department of Arts, Culture and History, who has final approval. Once the application is approved and the marker text is written, the actual production of the marker and its subsequent installation may take from **six to nine months**. Only markers approved in this manner may carry the State Seal.

#### CRITERIA

The West Virginia Highway Historical Marker (WVHHM) program has the goal of commemorating places, events, or persons prominently identified with the history or prehistory of the nation, state or region and possessing some degree of unique significance in West Virginia in terms of history, architecture, or cultural life. The marker program cannot mark all historic places in West Virginia; not only would this be an impossible task, such a proliferation of historical markers could create obstructions to the flow of traffic and diminish the distinction of those markers designating significant sites.

#### Specifically, a site to be marked by a WVHHM must possess one or more of the following:

- A. The primary event or contribution of significance being recognized must have occurred twenty-five years or more before the date of application.
- B. Be the birthplace, grave site, homestead, or the site of the original location associated with an individual or individuals who are no longer living and who played a uniquely significant role in national, state or local history. **Please Note:** Significance implies contributions or leadership of an outstanding nature: individuals who, for example, served in the military or in Congress must have served with distinctions in some other capacity that is not purely of local note or importance. Requests to single out individuals to be recognized with a marker when many people have shared equally in an event of historical importance will not be approved.
- C. Be the known site of occupation, structures or formations of obvious significance to the prehistoric people of the state. No marker shall identify the precise location of, or be within two miles, of such a site, if identifying the site would endanger the site's preservation and integrity.
- D. Be a natural site possessing unique or unusual geological, scenic or historical qualities for this area or region.
- E. Be a building or collection of buildings that embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, represent the work of a master, or be the former or re-located site of such a building or collection of buildings.
- F. Be associated with events that made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of national, state or local history, but such must **have occurred twenty-five years or more** before date of application.


- A sketch or map of the proposed location (Google Maps is acceptable).

Revisions may be made to ensure historical accuracy, clarify meaning, or meet the character requirements of the marker (Markers contain <u>11 lines of text</u>. 1st CARTER G. WOODSON SCHOOL

The building was a school for Black (35) students from 1912-1932. It was (31) named after Carter G. Woodson: (30) author, publisher and documented (32) Black historian. He organized the (33) annual "Black History Week" and (31) is considered the "Father of Black (34) History." Born in VA, he moved to (33) WV to work in the coal mines.
