Several hundred Union soldiers began marching toward Braxton, Webster and Upshur counties on April 17, 1862, to try to break up bands of bushwhackers who controlled the region. Maj. Ebenezer Andrews said in an April 22, 1862, dispatch that roughly 220 men had been sent to "scour thoroughly the infested Holly region."

Although his men did not find any armed rebels along their route, others did.
Skirmishes between Union and Rebel forces helped to persuade Rebel leaders to surrender and Confederate soldiers to desert "in large numbers, swearing Unionism and returning home."
At Andrews' request troops

also destroyed a nearby

salt works operation.

Andrews learned about the mine owned by a Virginia lawmaker from a muster roll of the guerrilla company Webster Dare Devils. Salt was a valuable commodity during the Civil War because it was used to preserve food and cure leather.

Ultimately, Andrews declared the entire effort a success. "The bushwhackers have also been taught a lesson by their losses of life and property which they will not soon forget," he wrote to his superior officers.
